Notes in MyChart allow you to track your health by viewing your provider's notes about your recent visits, test results, conditions, treatment plans and more.

Your provider uses notes to document your health care

Notes provide a clear summary of your condition for your entire health care team.

Your provider may use Notes to document:

- Details about your visit
- Observations
- Test results
- Details of care
- Treatment plans

Things to know about Notes

- Possible conditions may be listed in a note—these are not confirmed diagnoses.
- Notes are released to help you be more informed and involved in your care.
- Not all providers with MyChart share notes.
 - Trinity Health provider notes are shared automatically with some exceptions.
 - If you have a MyChart account for a hospital or provider outside Trinity Health, it is possible they do not share notes.

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Locating Your Provider Notes in MyChart

1. Log into your MyChart account
2. Go to **Visits**
3. Scroll through **Past** appointments to find correct visit
3. Click **View Notes**

Abbreviations of Clinical Terminology

When your doctor or care team uses Notes, they may use terminology or abbreviations that are known to other health professionals allowing them to quickly understand your current medical condition.

Common Clinical Abbreviations:

BMP:	Basic metabolic panel
BP:	Blood pressure
C&S:	Culture and sensitivity (performed to detect infection)
C/O:	Complains of
CBC:	Complete blood count
CC:	Chief complaint
Chem panel:	Chemistry panel (a blood test that indicates the status of the liver, kidneys and electrolytes)
DDX:	Differential diagnosis (the possible diagnoses being considered)
DM:	Diabetes mellitus
DOE:	Dyspnea on exertion (shortness of breath with activity)
ETOH:	Alcohol intake history
H&P:	History and physical
HPI:	History of present illness
I&D:	Incision and drainage
IMP:	Impression
LBP:	Low back pain
N/V:	Nausea or vomiting
P:	Pulse
PMH:	Past medical history
PRN:	As needed
R/O:	Rule out
SH:	Social history
SOB:	Shortness of breath
SQ:	Subcutaneous (underneath the skin)
T:	Temperature
UA:	Urinalysis
URI:	Upper respiratory infection
VSS:	Vital signs are stable
Wt:	Weight
